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Bullying

- A widely used definition: Systematic aggressive behavior against a person who finds it difficult to defend him/herself against the perpetrator(s)
 - Repeated attacks and power differential are central features





Bullying

- Takes numerous forms
 - Most often verbal abuse, public ridicule
 - BUT many other forms as well: physical, relational, cyber, ...
- More than just single attacks
 - bullying represents a rather stable relationship embedded in the larger peer setting



Cyberbullying, electronic byllying, online bullying

- Electronic victimization is rare, and almost always accompanied with traditional (verbal, physical, relational) victimization
- The longitudinal effects seem to be mainly driven by traditional rather than online victimization
- Rather than shifting the attention from traditional to online victimization, educators should continue their efforts on reducing victimization in general

 Universal phenomenon; about 10% of children and adolescents worldwide are systematic victims




Consequences of bullying and victimization

- Well-documented in research
- Victimization
 - anxiety, depression, loneliness
 - risk for depression, low self-esteem & difficulty to trust other people in adulthood
- Bullying others
 - learning to use aggression as a means to get what one wants
 - risk for criminal offending in adulthood
- Both bullying and victimization, "bully-victims"
 - the most maladjusted


Finland: Been bullied, %

Evidence-based bullying prevention is needed: 3 reasons

- 1. Negative short- and long-term consequences of bullying have been documented
- In bullying prevention, all actions are not likely to be equally effective
 Some can be waste of resources, even counterproductive
- 3. A systematic, research-based program can work, even at the national level: The Finnish experience



3. A systematic, research-based program can work, even at the national level: The Finnish experience

- The Finnish government decided that bullying prevention is a priority
- 2006: contract between the Finnish Ministry of Education and Culture & the University of Turku
 - development of a nationwide, research-based antibullying program
 - evaluation of the program
 - implementation of the program across the country



KiVa antibullying program

- The meaning of "KiVa"
- Developed at the University of Turku with funding from the Finnish Ministry of Education and Culture
 - Program co-leaders: Professor Christina Salmivalli and PhD, special researcher Elisa Poskiparta
- In Finland, now used by 90% of schools providing comprehensive education (basic education, grades 1-9)





History of KiVa

- 2006-2009 Development and evaluation of effectiveness
- 2009: Roll-out in Finland: 1465 schools
- **2010** : + 817 schools
- 2011 : + 290 schools + Åland Island
- 2012 : + 31 schools
- Evaluation study in the Netherlands
- Evaluation study in Delaware, US
- Small pilots in Wales, Luxembourg, Sweden
- 2013
- Evaluation study in Estonia
- Evaluation study in Italy
- Evaluation study in Wales
- A small pilot in Japan




Goals of KiVa

- Minimizing the negative effects of bullying




Background of KiVa: The social architecture of bullying

In order to reduce bullying...

- We do not necessarily need to change the victims, making them "less vulnerable"
- Influencing the behavior of bystanders can reduce the rewards gained by the bullies and consequently, their motivation to bully in the first place

 UNIVERSAL
- However, the victims need to feel that they are heard and helped by the adults at school
- The bullies need to be confronted for their unacceptable behavior



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INDICATED

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KiVa antibullying program

- Universal actions, indicated actions
 + constant monitoring
- A large amount of concrete tools
- Utilizing ICT: virtual learning environments
- KiVa is more systematic and structured than most existing anti-bullying programs
 - What to do, when to do it, how to do it,...
- Strong evidence of effectiveness

Indicated actions: KiVa team


In each school implementing the KiVa program, there is a KiVa team

- Three or more adults from among the school personnel, for instance :
 - a principal, a teacher, a school social worker
 - 2 X teacher, a special education tacher
 - a principal, a teacher, a school nurse

Does KiVa work? Strong evidence of effectiveness

In Finland

- Randomized controlled trial 2007-2009
 - 117 intervention and 117 control schools
 - >30,000 students (grades 1–9, 7–15 year old)
- First year of nationwide implementation (2009-2010)
 - 880 Finnish schools (cohort longitudinal design)
 - ~150,000 students (grades 1–9)
- Monitoring based on annual survey (2009–

KiVa...

 influenced multiple forms of victimization, including verbal, physical, and cyberbullying








Changes in being bullied by different forms during one school year

The effects are practically significant

• "In the Finnish student population of around 500,000 students, the reductions of this size amount to about 7,500 bullies and 12,500 victims during one school year" (Kärnä, 2011).





Additionally KiVa...

 reduced students' anxiety and depression and had a positive impact on their perceptions of peer climate



positive effects on school liking and academic motivation

(Williford et al, 2011)

(Salmivalli, Garandeau & Veenstra, 2012)



KiVa also influenced...

- children's perceptions on their teachers' attitudes and how well the teacher is able to do to reduce bullying
- teachers self-evaluated competence to tackle bullying, and teacher perceptions of bullying.

KiVa Indicated actions are effective

 The proportion of cases handled by the school team in which bullying...

Stopped completely 78.2%

Decreased 19.5%

Remained the same2.%

Increased0.3%

(Asked from the victims in the follow-up discussion)



Keep in mind...

- All the effects discussed so far are the effects of KiVa after the first year (nine months of implementation of KiVa)
- Since the broad roll-out in Finland (five years ago), there has been a steady annual decrease in the prevalence of bullying perpetrators as well as targets



Proportion of students who are systematically bullied by others / bullying others





KiVa's effectiveness abroad

- RCT in **the Netherlands**: the percentage of victims dropped from 29% to 13,5% (53%) in KiVa schools versus from 29% to 18,5% (36%) in control schools.
- RCT in **Estonia**: the percentage of victims dropped from 21,5% to 17,8% (13%) in KiVa schools. Slight drop also in the control schools but not significant.
- RCT in **Italy:** in KiVa primary schools, there was a reduction of 52% in victimization and a reduction of 55% in bullying others. In KiVa secondary schools, there was a reduction of 6% in victimization and a reduction of 40% in bullying others.
