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BULLYING VOCABULARY LOOP GAME

Objective of the game:

To revise vocabulary related to bullying and violence at school.

Duration:

10 minutes (or more if played many times)

Recommended age:

13+

Number of players:

19 (or less if players get more than one card each)

Preparation:

First let the students get acquainted with vocabulary related to bullying and violence at school. You will find the vocabulary list with word explanations at the end of this document.

Print out the loop game and cut it out in a sequence of two cards, with a word to the left and an explanation to the right. It is advisable for the teacher to keep a copy of the order of the sequences as a key during the game.

How to play the game:

Deal out a sequence of two cards among the students. The student who got the ERASMUS MINUS BULLYING card starts the game and reads out the explanation on the card to the right (Not willing to accept ideas, opinions, behaviour that are different from your own). The students should listen carefully to the explanation and decide if he/she has got the equivalent word on their card to the left (INTOLERANT). The person who read out the explanation has the answer written on his/her card to make sure it was the right answer. Then, the student who had the right word goes on reading the next explanation and the game continues until the loop returns to the first card (ERASMUS MINUS BULLYING).
